## Sudden Unexpected Infant Death (SUID) in Tarrant County

- Sudden unexpected infant death (SUID) is a category of deaths occurring among infants less than 1 year of age and includes three causes of death:
  - Accidental suffocation and strangulation in bed (ASSB)
  - Sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS)
  - Other ill-defined and unspecified causes (unknown)
- For the five years from 2018 to 2022, there were 124
   SUID deaths in Tarrant County
- Using the SUID category is customary for surveillance as it allows for consistent monitoring of mortality trends and comparisons across jurisdictions as reporting practices may vary
  - Figure 4 shows the differences between overall SUID rates among selected Texas counties
  - Figure 5 shows the variation in the specific causes of death among SUID cases in these counties

Figure 1. Tarrant County SUID rate by race/ethnicity, 2018-2022




Figure 2. Proportion of Tarrant County SUID cases by gender, 2018-2022





Figure 3. SUID rate in Tarrant County, Texas, and the United States, 2013-2022

Figure 4. SUID rate in the five most populous Texas counties. 2018-2022





Figure 5. Proportion of SUID cases by cause of death among the five most populous Texas counties, 2018-2022



Harris, Dallas, Tarrant, and Bexar counties had *similar SUID rates* in 2018-2022, yet the *specific causes of death* among these SUID cases *varies between these counties*. While some variation is expected, the degree of variation appears to support the theory that *practices in classifying these cases differ between providers and communities*. This is why we use the SUID category to describe and compare our community to others rather than a specific cause of death.

## American Academy of Pediatrics recommendations to reduce the risk of SIDS and other sleep-related infant deaths

- Babies should be put on their backs to sleep
- Use a *firm, flat, noninclined sleep surface* with only tight fitted sheets
- · Keep soft objects and loose bedding out of crib
- Babies should sleep in their parents' room, but not in their parents' bed
- Breastfeed as much and as long as possible
- Consider offering a pacifier at nap time and bedtime
- Keep baby away from smoke or nicotine exposure during pregnancy and after birth
- Avoid overheating and head covering in infants
- Pregnant women should obtain regular prenatal care and infants should attend all well-child visits
